#### WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR R.E?

We aim to develop thoughtful and reflective learners who can explore, discuss and understand a wide range of religious and non-religious beliefs. Children build a strong religious vocabulary and are able to interpret symbolism and meaning in different contexts. They compare similarities and differences between world faiths, consider the viewpoints of others and reflect on their own ideas in light of what they learn. Pupils are challenged to explore 'Big questions' about life, values and beliefs, making connections between what they learn in R.E. and their own lived experiences in the wider world.

# **HOW DO WE DELIVER THIS?**

R.E. is taught throughout the school following the Sandwell Agreed Syllabus ensuring a coherent and progressive curriculum. Our weekly lessons focus on developing religious literacy and critical thinking skills—which allow the children to have opportunities to ask questions, investigate beliefs and discuss their thoughts confidently. Our teaching encourages pupils to 'make sense' of religions and beliefs , whilst 'understanding the impact' of these beliefs on people's lives. By 'making connections' to their own experiences and the wider society, they will discuss how this impacts on the past and present.
